

A. Map of the








By 1832 Northwood Common has gone...




By 1872 the railway has arrived

Elmers End Road, early 1928, allotment site on right (courtesy of the Beckenham History Society)


The Great War 1914-1918

Beckenham Council designates the site as allotments



The Second World War and Britain was blockaded again. 'Dig for Victory' encouraged the public to produce their own food and allotment numbers peak at 1.4m. Rationing kept the demand for allotments and home grown foods high until rationing ended 1954.

By 1940 Dorset Road has been built but Beck Lane is a path through allotments










By 1999 the site is much smaller, Churchfields Road school has been built on part of the site and there are large uncultivated areas. But things have begun to change. The site entrance is now in Dorset Road, a self-management agreement and lease has been signed with **Bromley Council and** the clubhouse (a former changing room from Crystal Palace Park) has been installed.
